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Our Preschool Programme Past Month in Review

Sweetpeas: Over the past weeks the Sweetpeas have enjoyed so many exciting holiday activities. It has been wonderful to watch the children participate and enjoy painting, drawing, sticking and cutting as they created craft that they are so proud of. Our days were full of activities with so many opportunities to develop very important fine motor skills. We started off with NAIDOC day and the children got to paint Aboriginal symbols on pebbles, Winter Wonderland had the children painting with coloured ice and manipulating droppers to melt ice hiding lots of little treasures. When Teddy Bears Picnic day finally arrived there was so much activity with everyone making their own sandwiches carefully buttering and spreading vegemite, jam, cheese and ham. There were so many decisions to make about what would taste best. For Engineer Day we saw so many interesting constructions happening, using playdough, beads, pasta, toothpicks, foam balls etc requiring lots of concentration and fine motor manipulation to stack little pieces together. Healthy Bodies and Italian day had us all chopping up vegetables for yummy soup and pasta. The children really enjoyed this and there were some really good satisfied noises as the children ate the food they made. Participating in these activities has not only been fun but has helped to develop very important fine motor skills, the use of small muscles that control the hand, fingers and thumb. These are needed to enable children to perform important tasks such as wiring, drawing, manipulating objects, feeding oneself, dressing and hygiene tasks.

Bluebells: We are now into Term 3 and we are looking forward to a fun and busy few weeks! Over the past few weeks, we have been discussing all the ways we can look after our bodies and minds and as part of this we have been talking about healthy eating. We talked about our favourite foods, what food we need to give us energy, what food we need to make us

strong and what food we need to help us learn. The children were eager to share their own knowledge and voice their opinions on why we eat the things we do. Using stories, video clips and discussions, the children discovered new things such as a kiwi fruit gives us more Vitamin C than an orange does! Schoolies: What a fun filled Holiday Programme we have had. It was great to see the Schoolies really getting involved, whether it was getting dressed up, participating in a craft experience or engaging in group discussions surrounding the day's topic. A massive hit for the Schoolies was Winter Wonderland. We were lucky enough to have Carmel (Gabes Mum) come in from Jim Jams Music and do a music class with the children. They explored music through various instruments and learnt about tempo, pitch and creating a beat by engaging with resources and using parts of their body. Music helps the body and the mind work together. Exposing children to music, particularly singing, during early development helps them learn the sounds and meanings of words and increases their vocabulary. Dancing to music

helps children build motor skills while allowing them to practice self-expression. The valuable contribution parental visits make can improve children's social skills and build our Preschool community relationships and the children's sense of belonging. We love having family involvement at preschool so please feel free to come in and do a cooking or art class, discuss your heritage or simply read a book, the children love having family involvement.

Why is it important that my child gets the daily recommended servings of vegetables and fruits?

Fruits and vegetables are high in vitamins, minerals and fibre. Kids should be encouraged to eat a variety of fruits and vegetables – there is a rainbow of colours to choose from - which provides a rich source of antioxidants, instead of sugary snacks and fast food, which are high in fat and sugar. The vitamins, minerals, fibre and antioxidants found in fruits and vegetables provide the following benefits:

- Promote good health and protect against disease, both now and in the future.
- To ensure the child's healthy growth and development.
- Strengthen a child's immune system and help fight illnesses. There is strong evidence to show that the nutrients found in fruits and vegetables can prevent chronic diseases such as cardiovascular diseases.
- The high-fibre content can aid in the proper function of the diaestive system and prevent constipation.

Important information about your Child Care Subsidy Rates

Two things are currently happening that may affect your individual Child Care Subsidy. Please keep a close eye on your statement over the next couple of months as this may change your entitlements and if changed, this will change your outgoing expenses. For those in particular who have set up automated payments you may need to change the amount.



Please be advised that the Child Care Subsidy Rates changed from July 1st. Information can be found at the Parent Information Desk. Please keep an eye on your Preschool accounts from July onwards as your CCS entitlement may have changed and you may need to update your automated payments.



After the end of each financial year, Centrelink balances each family's Child Care Subsidy (CCS) entitlements ('balancing' is also known as 'reconciliation'). All families who received CCS in 2018-19 will go through this process. This can only happen after you have lodged a tax return for 2018-19, or advised Centrelink you are not required to lodge a tax return. For further information on the balancing process please visit:

Excursion to the Park for Schoolies Update


The new date for the excursion to the park is August 12th . If you are able to volunteer for this new date please let the teaching team know ASAP if you have not already done so.

children's knowledge on what was good and bad for our teeth. Matt asked the children how many times they should brush their teeth a day they all yelled, "2". Sam then got out their big Charlie Chomper and demonstrated to the children the correct way to brush their teeth.


Reducing Waste: During morning tea and lunch times it is good to see how the children really think about recycling waste. They are very careful to make sure the correct bins are being used in order to reduce our contribution to landfill. We use the yellow bin for recycled packaging, grey bin for plastic wrappings, not forgetting organic waste for the worm farm. We would appreciate your help by packing minimal wrappers, foil, plastic or commercial packaging wherever possible.











We have found a new friend as the children have been introduced to Peter Puppy!

Our phonemic awareness programme has come to a close for term two and the children have enjoyed discovering and exploring the 'P' sound. Peter Puppy loves playing in the park. Peter Puppy thinks the best time for playing in the park is just after it has been raining, because then he can paddle in all the puddles.

To reflect on the 'P' sound the children have been given the opportunity to engage in a fun hands- on paper plane experience that had been made available for them in our phonemic awareness play space. They were provided with pictures as visual instruction, to assist them as well as a variety of different coloured paper. This experience was a huge hit!

With some help and guidance from their educators and the instruction books they enjoyed folding and making **planes** whilst they also further developed their fine motor skills. Once they had made their **plane** it was now time for the fun part! Together they enjoyed flying and watching them glide across the room.









During the holiday programme the children have been given the opportunity to engage with a wide variety of texts and literacy focused resources in our phonemic awareness play space. This has allowed them to continue to explore and extend their understandings of the letter sounds that have been discovered this term.

Little En leavours



We are now half way through the preschool year and the children all participate in Little Endeavour activities with never ending enthusiasm. Apart from the activities we do there are so many great discussions on so many topics and everyone works together and helps each other out whether it is a group activity or not.



Making Snow

For Winter Wonderland day bi-carb soda and shaving cream was used to make our own snow. The texture is non sticky and even feels cold when you hold it in your hands and mould it. The children used great descriptive words as they talked about making our snow, what they could do with it and the sensations they felt when touching it.



DVD Case Recycling

We were donated DVD cases by a preschool family last year and this month used them to make some crazy DVD people which we are displaying in the windows above the doors to the outside play area. The children worked together in pairs (an older child and a younger child together) and it was interesting to see the dynamics as they planned their person. Different personalities showed through and it was not always the older child being a leader in the process!





Alphabet Tabletop Activity

This idea was seen by one of our educators online and we decided to make our own version on Alphabet Day. It took good fine motor skills and patience to put the activity together, with each child helping to complete a letter cap to put on the board. It is a fun alphabet matching game and the children are also refining fine motor skills as they twist the lids on and off the board. There was also a lot of discussion (again) about the different glues I use as today a new one was introduced to the children. We talk about why each one is useful - quick to dry, strong, clear etc - and the preschoolers are now starting to suggest which one I should be using when we work together.





Dear Everyone,

On Monday 8th April, we knew something exciting was going to happen. Everyone was talking about it. We waited and waited then the preschool doorbell rang. It was the lady from the farm and she was carrying—a box of eggs and an incubator. It was time for our baby chicks to arrive! Hurray!

We read a story called From Egg To Chicken which told us what was going to happen to the eggs. Some of us had questions about what the chicks would look like, what would they eat, where would they sleep but the one question everyone had was - When are they going to hatch?

All day Monday we watched and nothing happened. The educators came in on Tuesday morning and a couple of eggs had cracks in them. By the time children started arriving at 8.30 am, something was happening to one of the eggs! There was a bit of shaking, some tapping and we watched as the crack in the egg got bigger, until - a baby chick popped out! By the time we all went home on Tuesday afternoon, we had 4 baby chicks. By Wednesday afternoon, all 10 eggs had hatched and we had a healthy group of chicks.

As the chicks all hatched, we could see them getting bigger and stronger. Soon it was time to move them to the bigger box where they had food, water and somewhere to sleep.

We engaged in activities to learn more about the chicks and the changes they would go through as they grew at preschool. We painted pictures of the chicks, we did puzzles about chicks and we read books about the life cycle of a chick (EYLF Learning Outcome 2.4 Children become socially responsible and show respect for the environment).









Living Eggs Continued.....

After a couple of days of watching the chicks grow bigger and stronger, the time came for us to be able to hold them! We sat in a big circle as Lara spoke to us about how to hold the chicks safely so they wouldn't get hurt. We put a tissue on our hands and very gently, Lara put a chick into our hands or if we weren't too sure, we could just gently pat the chick.

We talked about what the chick felt like, sounded like and smelt like. Everyone was invited to share their thoughts on the chick with many children saying it was "cute" and "fluffy" while others talked about the colours on the feathers.

The educators were very impressed with how gentle everyone was with the chicks and we were sad to see them go after 2 weeks. We were delighted to send some chicks home with preschool families that promised to look after them and share photos with us as they grow.

<u>My thoughts on your learning</u>: Over the past two weeks, we have discovered the life cycle of an animal. By engaging your learning disposition of curiosity and asking questions, you have learned how the chicks grow and change and how to take care of another living being. Many of you discovered that although you were a little afraid of holding the chick, with the support of an educator you were able to engage on a level where you felt comfortable.

(EYLF Learning Outcome 1.1 Children feel safe, secure and supported. EYLF Learning Outcome 2.4 Children become socially responsible and show respect for the environment; Practice 5 Learning Environments).

Opportunities and Possibilities: Following on from our visit from the chicks, we spent some time talking about the life cycles of other animals such as butterflies, frogs, cicadas and used books, songs and videos to explore these in greater detail. We will follow this interest by spending more time engaging in experiences that allow us to see these life cycles taking place such as a butterfly hatching garden and explore the life cycle of frogs.







Quality Improvement Plan (QIP): Over the past two educator staff meetings the group has been reflecting on two of our Preschool policies; namely Cultural Inclusion and Anti-Bias Policy. Our focus has been to update the terminology and ensure the policies each promotea high level of engagement by educators and embed inclusive practices. These updated policies are now available in the Policy Book at the sign in table. If you would like to comment on these please let your educator know.
