WHAT CAN YOU DO TO KEEP YOUR CHILDREN HEALTHY THIS WINTER?

Maintain a healthy diet—Diet plays an important part in staying healthy. Boosting the immune system with lots of healthy fruit and vegetables during Winter is another way to ward off the season's nasty colds and flus!

Instil hand hygiene—Children are well-known for skipping handwashing, a key practice for fighting germs. Try to explain to your child the importance of proper and thorough hand washing techniques. According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), handwashing should be done for at least the length of time it takes to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice. Allow your child to sing out loud if it motivates them. Ensure that they practise this with regularity, especially at crucial times such as after preschool, using the bathroom and playing, and before eating or touching any food or drink items.

Keep your child hydrated—Keeping your child hydrated can be difficult during Winter. However, it's important as it helps regulate their body temperature and is essential to the proper function of cells, tissues and organs. Drinking water also gives their immune system a boost, preventing them from getting sick during Winter/flu season.



We ask you to please get your child to wash their hands on arrival or use the sanitiser when entering the Preschool each day.

We also ask you to closely observe your children and if they are suffering from a temperature, lethargy, runny nose, constant cough or headaches to please keep them at home and seek medical advice if required. If your child has been required a dose of Paracetamol or Dimetap etc. prior to coming to Preschool they should be kept at home. As per our policy if you give your child a dose of any medication prior to their day at Preschool you are required to notify Educators on arrival.

The spread of germs in this age group is inevitable as they are all learning how to care for themselves, and their immune systems are still developing, however if we can all work together to minimise the risks hopefully we will manage to get through the Winter season in good shape.

Sweetpeas and Bluebells: Here we are, Term 3 already! We hope you have enjoyed looking through your child's portfolio and please remember to come and speak to us if you would like to discuss anything from this.

The holiday programme has been a fun couple of weeks, where the children have had the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities. From science experiments, to making our own sandwiches, face painting, and dress up days, it was lovely to see the children so involved. Each day brought a new craft related to the day, such as painting rocks for NAIDOC, invisible ink painting, using recycled materials to build a vehicle, decorating Micky or Minnie Mouse ears and decorating our own sandwich bags. The children demonstrated a great level of enthusiasm and interest in the activities on offer, and we hope you enjoyed seeing these. Craft activities support the children's development in many ways, as well as being a lot of fun. The children used their hands to hold items such as stones, juggling balls, spray bottles etc, and this helps build the strength and control in their hands. Using paintbrushes, peeling stickers, drawing, using scissors etc, helps develop the pincer grip in their fingers. Developing hand strength and pincer grip are important experiences children need to have before they start the formal process of learning to write their name, and we offer many of these activities at preschool. We will continue to provide a variety of craft activities and will encourage the children to participate in these, and we invite you to have a look around the preschool walls to see what craft is there. Please also remember to check your child's craft folder too!

We look forward to supporting the Schoolies in their final months of preschool!

NAIDOC WEEK

Loud and Proud through stories, music and craft experiences. They were also introduced to a number of famous Indigenous people who have used their voice to make a positive difference. We enjoyed learning Darug language songs including Heads Shoulders in the Darug language and Budyari Nhaady'unyila Ngurrawa (Good I see you all on Country). The Darug people are the traditional owners of the Mt Colah land and every morning we thank them for letting us play and learn on the land through our Acknowledgement of Country. We also learnt some Indigenous games including Birray and Chiba. Birray (meaning march fly) involves a tipper who tips/gently stings the other children while blind folded. Chiba involves two teams with the aim to overarm throw paper balls over a divide, working together to remove the balls from their side. We also took part in rock painting, biscuit decorating using traditional Indigenous colours and created a Keep the Fire Burning banner.

Feature Creatures Week 22nd July







During Pet Week, some children expressed interest in knowing more about snakes so we invited Feature Creatures to preschool to allow the children to explore this topic in more detail. We spent the week learning all about reptiles and amphibians in anticipation for the incursion on Friday. The Features Creatures visit was an incredible hands-on learning opportunity where the children got to meet lots of interesting animals including Bruno and Mango the bearded dragons, Pipsqueak the baby Eastern long-neck turtle, Captain the Murray-Darling carpet python and Sir-Chomps-A-Lot the baby crocodile! They also learnt tips about how to stay safe around reptiles and amphibians, including the importance of running away and yelling "Snake!" if they ever spot a snake in the wild. Through this experience, the children all demonstrated their curious learning dispositions and enjoyed sharing their existing knowledge with Zoo Keepers Kirsten and Kev. They were also very brave, with many of them facing their fears in order to participate in this amazing experience!

Holiday Programme

What a great month we had in July, which included the holiday programme in which we made juggling balls, decorated pillowcases, used recycled materials to design and make wonderful creations and constructed catapults using only paddlepop sticks, elastic bands and a plastic spoon. The children showed how they are confident and involved learners as they participated in all the activities with curiosity and enthusiasm, communicating confidently with both educators and parent helpers.

<u>"STITCHING"</u> - After sewing the bark on our apple tree trunk the children were keen to do more stitching and so this activity was extended using open weave fabric, thread, beads, pasta, and a blunt needle. It was a great activity for their fine motor skills showing their co-ordination and listening skills as they followed instructions. They also confidently made decisions on the direction of their thread over the material and which items they would add. It was a great success and I will extend this activity further with more stitching later in the year.







<u>CLAY</u> - Clay is one of our favourite activities to strengthen hands and fingers of the preschoolers to develop their fine motor skills. We made fossil imprints in the clay once they had softened it by squeezing with their hands and then flattening it with their palms. The children were enthusiastic participants and noted the difference between the clays (white was softer than red) and the different shapes they could make before they flattened it out.









Phonemic Awareness Programme



As we explored the /p/ sound with Peter Puppy, the children focused on the topic Pet Safety. This allowed the children to share photos of their own pets as well as discuss how to approach pets safely. The Sweetpeas and Bluebells also became very interested in this topic, joining in with the experiences and leading to a Discovery topic the following week. We practised the four steps when approaching a dog – walk up slowly and stop, ask the



owner if you can please pat the dog, let the dog sniff your hand and pat the dog on the back. We were also lucky enough to have some special visitors visit to put our knowledge into practice! This included Taylah's

bunny Crunchie, Maddie's pet snake and Tegan's dog Spice. The children also enjoyed transferring their knowledge into their play as they engaged with the vet play space.

Revision

What a fun week full of songs, games and stories to revise the sounds learnt in Term 2. The children were introduced to some new games over the fortnight including Heads Up which involves the letter cards and the children providing clues such as the sounds that the letters make followed by guessing the letter. We also played I spy using the letter cards, finding objects around the room



that start with a certain sound. Another revision activity included setting up the hoops to play the coloured hoops game although with the letter cards. The children needed to find the matching letter based on the sound that was called out. We utilised our Smartboard to play interactive games that further developed the children's sound/letter recognition and production. Lastly, the magnetic letters and letter display was available for the children to practise writing the letters. During revision weeks, we reassess if the children can produce the sounds. It is always so lovely to



discover that a child can now produce a sound. If your child is having trouble producing ageappropriate sounds and is not currently receiving speech therapy, this will be communicated to you.





Mini Moves





Revision

Our Mini Moves sessions this month have been spent revising the skills we have practiced so far this year. This has included various fun games and activities incorporating our skills such as listen and move songs, hopscotch, follow the leader and 'Crocodile Tip' (a favourite amongst the Sweetpeas and Bluebells). It has been great seeing how the children's skills have developed since the start of the year, especially their hopping and leaping which they initially found quite tricky. We have also noticed the Sweetpeas and Bluebells incorporating their Mini Move skills into play and showing the Schoolies what they have been learning.

Side Sliding

This is the newest skill we have introduced to the Sweetpeas and Bluebells and they have already showed great coordination and determination. We will continue practicing this over the next few weeks with fun games such as 'The Old Grey Cat' and 'Snail Relay'.

Next up this term: Catching and galloping!







QIP—Cultural Responsiveness

This month we have been exploring the Afrikaans culture which represents some of our families backgrounds. Educators have taught this through language, music and food. The children have learnt new everyday Afrikaans words which we have incorporated into our daily routine.



Adele also shared part of her Afrikaans culture, making the children some yummy traditional cinnamon pancakes 'Pannekoek' and teaching some songs including "My lyfie maak musick" which translates to 'My body makes music'.

Coming up MCPK will be holding a school readiness talk hosted by Mr. V-T. We will provide more information once this is finalised.






