Why Dress Ups are Important

This month at Preschool the children have loved engaging in dress ups. Through dress ups the children develop a range of skills.

Brain Building—Dress-up engages your child’s brain and memory.

Vocabulary Building—Dress-up play builds vocabulary as a child decides what his or her character would say. It gives them a chance to expand their vocabularies.

Problem-Solving—Who’s going to be the doctor? Who’s going to be the patient? Children must make decisions when they engage in dress-up play.

Empathy—When a child is engaged in role-play, it helps them see the world through another’s eyes which increases empathy – whether pretending to be a parent nurturing a baby, or a doctor.

Emotional Development— Children process their fears through play, which helps them make sense of the world, and overcome their feelings of helplessness. By allowing children to act out their fears through dress-up and role playing, we are helping their emotional development.

Motor Skills—Children develop fine motor skills by putting on dress-up clothes, whether buttoning a shirt, zipping up pants, or tying on a pirate’s bandana. They use their large motor skills when engaged in role-play, whether they are jumping like a superhero, running like a baseball player, or twirling like a ballerina.

Socialisation—Dress-up play encourages cooperation and taking turns. Children learn how to negotiate as they agree on stories and rules.

Imagination—When children engage in dress-up play their imaginations are given free reign. There is no limit to who, where, or what they can be.

Imitation—Children are naturally imitative creatures. They learn about the world by imitating the lives of the adults and others around them. Through dress-up and dramatic role-play, children explore the lives of other people by imitating their actions, feelings and words.

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Our Preschool Programme in Review

Sweetpeas: The children have had a wonderful month learning so many new skills. We have taken every opportunity to promote self-help skills by encouraging everyone to have a go. It has been wonderful to see how well the Sweetpeas have managed with the morning drop off routines, needing very little assistance to get organised for the day. First finding name tags, choosing a locker and then unpacking lunch and morning tea boxes, making sure to put them in the correct baskets for the day. Depending on what the weather is doing the children put on hats and take drink bottles outside, or if staying indoors choosing activities to engage in for the morning. Throughout the day there are many opportunities to follow instructions as we transition from one activity to the next. Toilet routines, putting on and taking off shoes and clothing are good learning opportunities to develop these important self-help skills. By giving encouragement and support the Sweetpeas are learning to be independent, but not afraid to ask for help.

Bluebells: May is behind us and it has been another busy, lovely month. This month we learned about our bodies and how these work. We discovered the names of our bones and we now use these names in games! The Bluebells have been enjoying spending time together as a group as we work on developing stronger social skills. This group enjoys games such as Duck Duck Goose, Bug In a Rug and simple games of passing the ball, using each others names as we do so, developing a knowledge of each other too. These games are a lot of fun and also encourage the children to share, think of others and fairness. When we play these games, we talk about making sure everyone has a turn and not always picking the same friends and the children are developing a good understanding of why this is important. Games such as these also encourage our counting skills as well as our gross motor skills. If your child is talking about a particular friend at home, we are happy to support you in organising a playdate outside of preschool, please just let us know.

Schoolies: We are very fortunate here at Mt Colah Preschool to have such an adventurous, stimulating and welcoming environment both inside and outside. Contemporary theories and research informed by the Reggio Emilia approach recognise and value the environment as a 'third teacher'. Over the past month, our Schoolies have been particularly interested in our outdoor environment including our bottom garden which consists of the fort, mud kitchen, pirate ship, climbing frames and trees for climbing. The climbing equipment has been very popular as the children have enjoyed challenging themselves as they coordinate their bodies up and over the A-frames, across the beams and onto the stepping stones. They have continued to develop their gross motor skills through climbing and hanging from the trees, strengthening their upper body strength. Behind educators and families, physical spaces hold the potential to influence what and how children learn, including allowing them to take healthy risks. The children have emerged themselves in nature as they cooked delicious meals in the mud kitchen, painted the tree trunks with water and collected flower petals to make flower perfume.

We will be attempting to now double this as we continue to fundraise for our chosen charity—we will be putting out a feedback form for families to decide which charity we donate to so stay tuned!




USING RAIN WATER

Phonemic Awareness Programme

During the month of April, the children have been learning about the focus sounds /h/ and /m/. The Schoolies have been engaged in a variety of songs, stories, activities and craft experiences with the Letterland characters Harry Hat Man and Munching Mike.

Harry Hat Man



While learning about the letter/sound H, the children explored different houses from around the world as well as constructed houses of their own using recycled materials and loose parts. The children also enjoyed utilising Google Maps to see an aerial view of their home. Harry Hat Man hide 'n' seek was a fun activity for the children to repetitively produce the name Harry Hat Man as they hid him throughout the playground, taking turns hiding and seeking. Lastly, the children role played different characters as they tried on a variety of different hats.

Munching Mike



While learning about the letter/sound M, the children discovered how magnets work, including their ability to attract and repel. The children sorted different materials into magnetic and non-magnetic baskets. We also explored different foods starting with /m/ including macarons and mangoes. This led to making our own play dough macarons and selling them at the macarons shop. For a special treat, the children made mango milkshakes! Leaving them with a mango milkshake moustache! This was very funny.



National Road Safety Week May 16th

During the week the children explored 'Road Safety' in various forms. Educators used visuals of real life road signs which allowed the children to actively engage and contribute to group discussions on road and car safety. Children were provided with role play scenarios, around seat belts, bike safety and pedestrian safety. It is important that we continue to educate the children to understand the importance of these.

We ask that all families, continue these discussions at home with your child and are putting these safety messages into action when leaving the Preschool. We encourage you to use the orange road safety mat and remember the importance of safety on our driveway, holding hands when leaving the Preschool and when crossing the driveway to get to your car.

For the children it involves numeracy (counting out and measuring ingredients), literacy (following the recipe), science (watching the mixture change as we add ingredients) and collaborative work, to name a few areas. Mother's Day SUPERWOMEN – The preschoolers became aware of similarities and differences in families as children spoke about who they would give their superwoman to. Mother's Day



Winter Reminders

We encourage you to keep active over the cooler months to support overall health and wellbeing. At Preschool we will still be going outside to play and remind families to ensure that your child has warm clothes at Preschool so they can fully participate and enjoy our outdoor experiences at any time.



Staying Healthy

As we head into the cooler months of the year and to potential cold and flu season we would like to remind families of ways they can support the Preschool environment to stay healthy. If your child is presenting with any of the following symptoms you must keep them home and seek doctors advice if necessary: • severe, persistent or prolonged coughing • breathing difficulties (e.g. noisy, wheezy) • yellowish skin or eyes • irritated eyes, eye lining red, pus from eyes • unusual spots or rashes • vomiting and/or diarrhoea • temperature over 37.5 degrees celsius • behaviour exhibited that is not 'normal' for the child (e.g. sleeping, being unable to participate in the daily activities as usual).

We ask that you do not bring any unwell child into the service and you do not enter the service if you are unwell.
