### **Transition to School**

It has been lovely to see how our Schoolie' group has blossomed this year and how confident and independent they are becoming on their journey towards big school. At the beginning of fourth term we are implementing some little changes to the educational environment for the children who are heading off to school next year. These changes are designed to further strengthen their self help and independence skills.

# Our curriculum will include but not be limited to:

- Signing in will be conducted outside the gate and Schoolie parents will be asked to sign your child in, then pass your child through the gate. It is then up to them to unpack their morning tea, lunch, Show and Tell item in the baskets and choose their locker. (Of course the educators will be there to provide support!). It will be helpful to have Schoolie children to Preschool by 9am.
- At lunch time Schoolies will be encouraged to open their lunches themselves and to finish their lunch within a set time.
- A focus will be placed on encouraging our Schoolies to participate appropriately at group times by putting up their hand to speak and listening to the speaker.
- Schoolie children will be encouraged to complete tasks and activities they choose, to practice the discipline of persistence.

- Schoolie children will be encouraged to use their expressive communication skills when needing something from a teacher or when playing co-operatively with friends.
- We will be doing some concentrated work on rhyming words through games, nursery rhymes and singing along, and of course with our Phonemic Awareness Programme. It is so important for your children to play with sounds as this is a great foundation for learning to read and spell.
- Schoolie children will continue to be encouraged to hold their pencil correctly and to sit at the table correctly when drawing.
- Schoolie children will be encouraged to pack their own bags before going home.
- Visits by Big School Teacher and students - week commencing November 25th.

### *Our Preschool Programme Past Month in Review*

**Sweetpeas:** I can't believe that we are into the last semester of the year. The Sweetpeas have gained so much confidence since the start of the year. They have engaged in many fun activities and over the last month, especially during the holiday program, enjoying many sensory experiences which is crucial to brain development. The Sweetpeas have enjoyed making play dough, playing with shaving foam mixed in sand, ice melting, finger painting, exploring our sensory garden, creating with clay, sandpit play and baking. Learning through sensory exploration comes naturally to young children and these activities have helped stimulate all their senses by touching, tasting, smelling, seeing, moving and hearing. Sensory play experiences support language development, fine and gross motor skills, problem solving skills and social interaction as children exchange thoughts and ideas during this sensory play experiences. *'Play is the answer to how anything new comes about'* - Jean Piaget

**Bluebells:** Another busy month has passed and this one brought a fun filled holiday programme. The Bluebells enjoyed many activities such as having their nails painted, planting in the garden, lots of baking and learning all about Scotland! Over the past month, the educators have observed the children showing an interest in Auslan, the Australian sign language. At our Christmas concert last year, we performed a song in Auslan and the children have been keen to revisit that. From this, lots of questions have been asked about Auslan so we decided to spend some time learning more about Auslan and learning some signs. The children discovered the alphabet can be signed and we took the time together to learn the alphabet, especially the letter our own name started with. We also learned some signs such as hello, please, thank you, my name is, happy, sad and we learned to sign to the I Can Sing A Rainbow song. We talked about Auslan being a form of communication. The children demonstrated a good understanding of the importance of Auslan and were very keen to learn this. We enjoyed watching some stories on you tube that were also in Auslan and you may wish to share one of these with your child, in particular we liked "Too Many Elephants In This House" and "The Wrong Book".

### *Our Preschool Programme Past Month in Review*

**Schoolies:** What a busy month the Schoolies have had, it has been great to see how far all the Schoolies have come this year and the excitement is starting to build as the transition to big school comes closer and closer. The Schoolies have taken a very strong interest in the topic 'Farmers'. Steph recently had a visit to a farm and brought back photos to show the children. They loved seeing

the cows, poddy calves, sheep, horses and dogs, but their first comments were of concern noting, "The ground looks grey, how do the animals eat the grass?" Steph explained that the farmers are feeding the animals hay between once and twice a day due to the lack of crops. The children have shown great empathy and care for the farmers and are very saddened by the effect the drought is having on them. We have engaged in various experiences such as pin the tail on the pig, drawing classes, learning the song Old Mc Donald Had a Farm in sign language and reading various texts to further extend their interest and knowledge on farming. We have created a project board to display all the children's learning and the various experiences they have engaged in to further their

knowledge.

In the upcoming week we will have our Kindifarm visit and further explore our role in helping drought affected farmers and the importance of conserving water. These are great conversations to have at home with your children. You can help currently by purchasing Famers Own milk to support our farmers. The children loved seeing the educators use this milk at preschool.



# Big School Week! Week Commencing November 25th

Children heading off to school next year are very welcome to wear their school uniform during this week. During Big School Week we will be having visits from local schools. A teacher and



several kindergarten students visit and talk to all the children about school, show off their school uniforms and read our preschooler's stories.

The teacher also introduces our children to a book called "Big School". This book was produced in collaboration between local schools and local prior to school services and offers the preschooler's a great pictorial guide to all the different places in our local schools. This book is then left out for our Preschool children to look at for the remainder of the year. We have been conducting Big School Week in collaboration with local schools for a number of years as it provides another Important transitional link for the children heading off to school



### Transition to School Tips—what can you do at home

*Read A Story.* Make a special time every day to read to your child, ask questions about the story and have a conversation asking your child what they enjoyed about the story.

*Sing Songs and Play with Rhyme.* Increase your child's phonemic awareness and build their vocabulary by reading Nursery Rhymes and Dr Seuss and singing songs together.

*Orientation*. Make good use of orientation programmes at your school of choice and use every opportunity to network with children and their families attending your school .

*Play Dates*. Organise regular play dates with other children during the holiday break to continue to practice relationship building and those important social skills

*Increase Independence.* Give your child small jobs to do around the house; support them to look after their own belongings on outings; pack and unpack their bag for Preschool; encourage them to make their own decisions; support them to persist with challenging tasks.

*Talk about Starting School.* Answer frankly any questions your child may have, explain how things they are already able to do in our Preschool environment will be the same things they need to do for school. Discuss all the things you discovered during school orientation.

# Sustainability Programme

**Return and Earn** Thank you to all the families who have supported this project this year. \$120 of the money raised from this venture was recently used by the Schoolies during their excursion to The Four Seasons, buying flowers, vegetables, herbs and pots for the garden. **Cartridge and Toner Recycling** We are a drop off point for Planet Ark recycling for ink cartridges and toner. The box is next to our big computer, just drop it in and we'll sort out the rest.

Book Exchange The children continue to enjoy the book exchange and there continues to be a variety of books available to the children. Please remember to have a look through at the end of the day and you may find a new story for bedtime!

Water Saving We were lucky enough to have a few days of rain recently and we collected the water in a big container for using in our garden. The children are becoming much more aware of how important it is to be water wise and are putting what they have learned into practice such as turning off the taps and using the short flush in the toilet. Any unused water at the end of the day is also used in the garden.









# Sustainability Programme

**Recycle** The children are encouraged to think about what we can recycle at preschool and we have a soft plastics bin for such items. This is taken regularly to Coles to be recycled and the children have become very skilled in recognising what can and can't be recycled.

Recycled Craft During the holiday programme, the children engaged their creative skills with the recycled materials box. Using yoghurt pots, kitchen roll tubes, sticky tape rolls they used their imagination to create some wonderful inventions such as robots, fairies, cars etc. The children discussed what these were originally used for and shared their thoughts on recycling for craft. On Spring Day we also used donated yoghurt pots to plant our sunflower seeds. If your sunflowers are growing, we would love to see some photos!











Who is this jumping high in the air above Letterland? Jumping Jim lives in a jigsaw house, which he put together himself. Can you guess why he lives in a jigsaw house? Because jigsaw begins with his letter sound! Ask Jumping Jim what he enjoys most and he will tell you, 'Jumping' and 'Juggling'.

To practice Jumping Jim's letter sound, the children have been given the opportunity to engage in some experiences where they have explored the joys and pleasures of literacy as well as also exploring their physical wellbeing. A new audio book called, 'Animal Boogie' was introduced to the children. This story has been a huge hit with many of the children where it took them on a Journey as they walked through the Jungle. During this experience, the children viewed, listened and sung along to the words in the story. An array of jungle animals were discovered throughout the story whilst a rather catchy instrumental tune is played. This story and song also offered opportunity for the children to explore rhythm whilst having fun as they explore and play with words.

## **Jumping Jim**

We have had so much fun meeting Jumping Jim and learning about his special sound.

With juggling being one of Jumping Jim's most favourite things, the children were given the opportunity to explore their hand- eye coordination, balance and strength whilst practising their own juggling skills. To extend on from the children's obvious enjoyment in the juggling experience, Jo carried out an experience where the children made their own juggling balls using rice and balloons. A hands on experience was also carried out where the children assisted in making 'J...J...J., Jelly' for our underwater sensory play tray linked to a recent group time topic of interest, water safety.

An array of items were brought in from home from by some of the children that that started with Jumping Jim's letter sound. Items that were brought in included, jewellery, toy jeeps and a pretend jug.

This has been a very busy month with Little Endeavours and the Holiday Programme and the children have enjoyed every moment!





The first thing I noticed after I selected photos for this month's newsletter was how hands on we were this month with everyone touching and manipulating a great variety of materials. The children have loved all these sensory activities using all their senses, and fine motor skills, as they explored and created. They also used great expressive language to describe how things felt and smelt.

<u>Baking</u> – We mixed and baked zucchini and carrot cake with great co-operation between the preschoolers as they helped each other in the process.





<u>Spring Day</u> – We all love gardening activities and the children noticed we were using recycled yogurt pots to plant our sunflower seeds.

<u>Juggling Balls</u> - Everyone loved making their juggling balls, all working together and helping each other, and we were all impressed with Jack's demonstration of how he could juggle.

When you had arrived at The Four Season Nursery you were all keen to explore your surroundings as you went about looking for your assigned plants. Before we knew it you all successfully found your assigned plants with assistance from your parent helper. We then continued to explore the nursery a little longer. One of our parents suggested that we get a mint chocolate plant. You all were very keen to try the taste of it's leaves. You all loved it so much leaving there were not many leaves left on the plant.

It was now time to leave The Four Seasons Nursery so you farewelled the helpful staff and thanked them for the discount on our purchase, and we greatly appreciate this kind and supportive gesture from our community friends.
